On September 18, members of the Richmond University Medical Center family celebrated a young woman who has been called "a true warrior in our Hematology Oncology Department." Yanebelkis Mora, 24, and members of her family were on hand at the Old Bermuda Inn catering hall as she was presented with the opportunity to take an all-expenses paid vacation to a location of her choosing courtesy of the Dixie Fund. Also honored that night for his care of Mora was RUMC's pediatric oncologist Mario Peichev, MD.

For the past 66 years, the William D. Wernicoff Children's Foundation of Esquire Lodge, Inc. also known as The Dixie Fund, has fulfilled its mission of giving aid and assistance to handicapped or infirm children. This organization fulfills the dreams of cancer patients who have aged out of the "Make a Wish Foundation" and in turn, offers "Make a Dream Come True" for patients ages 17 to 25 years old. Dr. Peichev selected Mora whom he has cared for over the past several years.

Joined by her mother Altagracia Andres Marte and family friend Edison Suarez Flores, Mora said she is planning to finish obtaining her high school diploma,

an achievement put on hold as she battled her cancer. Once that is accomplished, she will select a location for her trip. She said she wanted to select a place she and her whole family could enjoy together because they were such a strong source of strength and foundation during her treatment.



Each year at this time, while the leaves are beginning to change color, it seems like the whole world turns pink...for good reason. October is National Breast Cancer Awareness Month and pink is its official color, the distinctive pink ribbon becoming synonymous with October.

The pink ribbon movement began as a grassroots effort in the early 1990s when 68-year-old Charlotte Haley handmade peach ribbons to raise awareness about the lack of funding

for cancer prevention research. SELF magazine published a story about her and requested the rights to her ribbons. She said no, not wanting to go commercial. So, in 1991, SELF created ribbons in another color: pink. The rest, as they say, is history.

Researchers around the world are working to find new and effective ways to prevent, detect, and treat breast cancer, as well as improve the quality of life of patients and survivors. Yet, despite all our efforts, breast cancer remains a persistent adversary. It remains the most common cancer in women in the United States, except for skin cancers, and accounts for about 30%, or 1 in 3, of all new female cancers each year. According to the American Cancer Society, this year alone over 310,700 new cases of invasive breast cancer will be diagnosed in women, about 56,500 new cases of ductal carcinoma in situ will be diagnosed, and sadly, nearly 42,300 women will die from breast cancer.

Our hospital has been at the forefront of the battle against breast cancer throughout our over 100 years of service to Staten Island. We proudly are home to the longest consecutively accredited cancer program on Staten Island, having first earned accreditation from the American College of Surgeons' Committee on Cancer back in 1937. In 2018, we opened our state-of-the-art Center for Cancer Care at 1000 South Avenue and later that same year, our world class Breast and Imaging Center at 1161 Victory Boulevard. Early detection is key. The 5-year survival rate for localized breast cancer,

meaning the cancer is contained to the breast, is 99%. The American Cancer Society recommends that women ages 40 to 44 who are at average risk consider a mammogram every year, and women ages 45 to 54 should have one completed annually. Please contact our Breast and Imaging Center at 718-818-1161 and make an appointment today. Do it for yourself and your loved ones.

No registration is needed. Just come down to our RUMC booth and remember to wear your pink! We look forward to having you on our RUMC team of walkers!

After the walk, please join us at Royal Crown Bakery and Cafe for an after-walk party. A complete lunch with desserts to follow will be served from 11:30 AM to 2:00 PM. It's \$50 per person with all proceeds going to support our Breast and Imaging Center. Royal Crown is located just a few short blocks from the walk at 1350 Hylan Boulevard at the corner of Old Town Road. Come and enjoy a delicious lunch and support us in the fight against breast cancer.




Happy Retirement to Rosemarie!
